

**Grants Policy Committee
April 21, 2009 Stakeholder Webcast
Feedback Results**

All data reflects participation as of May 7, 2009.

Sign-in Data

- Stakeholders from all 32 States and the District of Columbia participated in the Webcast.
- More than 58% of people who logged-in to the Webcast were participating for the first time.
- 78% of viewers were non-federal.

Participation Data

- More than 200 viewers participated in the GPC Stakeholders' Webcast on April 21, 2009. Since the live webcast more stakeholders continue to log-in to view the archived webcast, which is available 24/7 on www.GPC.gov.
- 97% plan to participate in future Webcasts.
- GPC reported an increased substantive interest in this Webcast, in particular, as evidenced by a high volume of diverse questions regarding Recovery Act implementation guidance.

Webcast Satisfaction

- 54 participants provided feedback on the Webcast through a non-mandatory survey.
- Participants had the opportunity to rate aspects of the Webcast as Poor, Satisfactory, or Excellent.
- 97% rated the Webcast as Satisfactory or Excellent overall.
- Satisfaction with each of the subtopics was 94% respectively.

Common Feedback Themes

- Continue webcasts; viewers look forward to participating in the future.
- Stakeholders appreciate the ability to submit questions in real time and have them addressed.
- When possible, provide more substantive discussion on grantee related activities.
- Improve technical aspects of the Webcast and access for federal stakeholders who may have security issues.
